How were they drawn? Could you create your own images of a forest using pens or pencils? You could even draw this on Purple Mash.</p>
<p>Inference How does the bear feel at different points in the story? Find at least three different feelings. Can you find some evidence to support your ideas?</p>	<p>On YouTube, put on a crackling fire and snuggle up with your favourite books. Drink a hot chocolate and share a book with someone for 20 minutes.</p> 	<p>Book Potato Characters Can you recreate one of the characters from the story by making a potato character?</p>	<p>Musical Drawing When the bear plays, he dreams of strange and wonderful lands. Listen to a piece of piano music and draw/write/describe what it makes you dream about.</p>
<p>Postcard Write a postcard as if you are the bear writing to his friends back in the forest. Think about what he might want to tell them about his adventure.</p>	<p>Word it Out Head over to https://worditout.com/ and create your own wordle by filling it with reasons why reading is important to you.
